

Suitable for ages 3 and above

You will need:

- Access to a printer
- Felt tip pens, colouring pencils or crayons
- Scissors
- A paper plate or cereal box
- Ribbon or string
- Glue
- Sticky tape




Create an Easter wreath to hang on your front door or around your house in Spring. The last two pages of this activity sheet include templates you can use to make your wreath.

Instructions

Step 1:

First, decide which template you would like to use. We have one with blank eggs for you to design your own patterns on, or one with patterns already drawn out that you can colour in. Or you could use a mixture of the two.



Step 2:

Print out your chosen template. Then draw your patterns on and/or colour the eggs in with felt tip pens, colouring pencils or crayons.



Step 3:


Cut out all your eggs. They are quite close together so be careful as you do this, and ask a grown up if you need help.

How to make... an Easter wreath

Step 4:

Take your paper plate and cut out the centre. To help you do this, fold your paper plate in half and cut into the middle of the fold. This will create a hole, when you open your plate back up, that you can get your scissors in to.

If you don't have a paper plate, use an old cereal box and draw around a small plate, then cut out the centre in the same way as above.




Step 5:

Decide how to arrange your eggs around your ring and glue them down on to the paper plate, overlapping them slightly as you go.




Step 6:

Cut a length of ribbon or string and fold it in half. Tape your ribbon ends to the back of your wreath to create a loop for hanging.



Step 7:

If you have enough, make a little bow out of the ribbon and tape it in place at the top of your wreath.




Step 8:

Now find the perfect place to hang your decoration!
