

Suitable for ages 5 - 11 independent working Suitable for ages 3 - 4 with adult help

You will need:

- Toilet roll tube
- Paper (coloured if you have it)
- String, ribbon or wool
- Bead, paper clip or a penny
- Felt tip pens or colouring pencils
- Glue
- Scissors
- Tape
- Stapler (optional)
- Access to a printer (optional)



If you enjoyed Edward Wren's reading of <u>The Paddo</u>, why not make one of these simple, yet effective frogs - inspired by the Paddo character in the story. While away the afternoon practising your hand-eye co-ordination as you try to catch that pesky fly! This activity sheet includes a template.

Instructions


Step 1:

Choose a colour for your frog, use coloured paper if you have it. Mark out the length of your toilet roll tube and cut a strip to that width.



Step 2:

Roll your strip around your toilet roll and mark the point where the ends overlap slightly. Cut your strip to this length. Now is a good time to colour in your paper with felt tip pens, colouring pencils or crayons if you are not using coloured paper.



Step 3:

Put glue all over your paper and glue around the toilet roll tube.



Step 4:

Repeat steps 1 and 2 with the colour for the inside of your frog's mouth.



Step 5:

Put glue all over your paper and insert it into your toilet roll. Press down hard to secure them both in place.



Step 6:

Fold one end of your toilet roll down and either glue or staple the ends together.



Step 7:

Draw out your frog's legs on a separate piece of paper and colour them in. Or print out our template.



Step 8:

Glue your legs into place.



Step 9:

Cut out two circles of white paper for eyes.




Step 10:

Decorate your frog using felt tip pens, colouring pencils, pompoms or coloured paper.



Step 11:


Draw out two identical flies or use our template and colour them in.



Step 12:

Cut a length of string or wool about 20 - 30cm long and sandwich your fly together over the end.

Tip: the longer the piece of string the more difficult it is to catch the fly.



Step 13:

Tie a bead or a button onto the end of your string next to the fly. This is to give it a little weight; if you don't have either a button or bead you could slip a paper clip onto the fly or tape a penny or 5p piece onto one side.



Step 14:

Tape the other end of your string or wool into the mouth of your frog.



Now you've made your Frog Fly Catcher you just need to practise the art of feeding your frog.

A quick flick of the wrist and the fly will arc into the air; try and catch it in the open mouth of your ever hungry, greedy frog. Ribbit! Ribbit!
