

Little Angel Theatre is very proud to have been named Fringe Theatre of the Year at The Stage Awards 2024.

We are truly honoured to have been recognised in this way, after incredible dedication from everyone who works here and supports us. This award celebrates all of the shows that have appeared at our home in Islington, on the West End stage, and those that have been packed up into suitcases and presented in hospitals, prison visiting rooms, refugee accommodation and schools across the country. Most importantly, this award emphasises the power of puppetry, and shines a light on the impact of theatre for young audiences.

On Stage

This year, Little Angel Theatre's productions have gone from strength to strength. We have mounted four new shows and brought five others back to life, catering for audiences as young as six months (*The Bed* and *Persephone*) all the way through to those over 10 (Medusa's First Kiss). Charlie Cook's Favourite Book (adapted from the book by Julia Donaldson and Axel Scheffer) became our first solo-produced, mid-scale show and headed out on tour across the country, after its run at the Studios over Christmas. In December 2023, we had a record seven shows performing across London and the country, including The Smartest Giant in Town (co-produced with FieryLight) returning to the West End.

Our Puppets for All scheme has continued to grow, and this year we gave out 5,375 tickets to families, school children and their teachers who wouldn't otherwise be able to visit us. It is thanks to the hard work of all the staff and freelancers that we work with that Little Angel continues to create and perform shows at the highest level, and we are delighted that this dedication has led to LAT being named Fringe Theatre of the Year at the Stage Awards 2023.

Our first-ever Children's Puppetry Festival took place across both LAT venues from 6th August – 3rd September 2023. The vibrant programme showcased a broad range of puppetry by the most exciting UK and international companies currently making theatre for young audiences. We were delighted that our inaugural puppetry festival won a one-off Offie Award at this vear's Off West End Awards.

On Screen

Today's children are digital natives and they engage with the world differently. At LAT we are always exploring digital strands of work and trying new things, to make sure we stay with our audience - and they stay with us! This year we have continued to produce and commission online content showcasing the best digital makers of puppetry, and have brought creativity into people's homes. Our online content has allowed people from 57 countries to engage with LAT and our 6 digital commissions this year have been watched by over 2,500 people. The aim for the next year is to increase the volume of free online content on our YouTube channel, including a brand new series of puppet-making activities, as well as continuing the commissioning model to engage artists working in the digital sphere.

This year we have been able to increase our Pay-per-View option, which now offers a digital version of all of our shows for a limited time. This enables us to reach those who might face barriers to accessing our venues - these could be geographical, physical or socioeconomic.

We run a 'pay it forward' scheme which allows you to make a donation, at the point of purchasing a ticket yourself, to give another family the opportunity to experience the performance. This could be a subscriber to our Puppets For All scheme, a child who is in hospital or long term care and their family, or a beneficiary from a local community partner organisation (for example Islington Centre for Refugees and Migrants).

FOUNDATION

This year, Little Angel Theatre commissioned six short films from refugee, asylum seeker and/or migrant artists. This innovative digital element of The Welcome Project (one of our Suitcase Theatre shows) allowed us to reach out and connect with young children and families who have lived experience of migration, as well as financially support adult artists from these backgrounds who may face barriers in the arts sector. Responding to the theme of 'Welcome', the films were created to be accessible to non-English speaking families and incorporated a range of digital puppetry styles. These films are all still available on our YouTube channel and allowed The Welcome Project to transcend geographical restrictions.

Artist Development

In the last year, LAT has continued to be at the forefront of puppetry artist development in the UK. We delivered a year-long fullyfunded traineeship to an emerging designer, providing them with the necessary skills and tools to enter the industry as an up-andcoming maker. We continued to run a series of successful adult professional development courses for practitioners at different stages of their puppetry journey. Additionally, we are re-starting a Marionette-Carving Course and will continue to run this into the future, with the ultimate goal of removing marionette making from the Red-List of Endangered Crafts. We continue to provide bursaries on all our courses to give access to individuals who might face barriers accessing these opportunities.

Moving forward we are looking to implement plans for a wider Artist Development programme which, if successfully funded, will provide a comprehensive platform for both emerging and established puppetry talents to hone their skills, explore new techniques, and contribute to the evolution of puppetry as an art form.

HOW CAN YOU HELP?

LAT are fundraising for an innovative artist development programme to help train the next generation of puppeteers.

- £265 covers one bursary place for a 10 week termly puppetry course, allowing one aspiring puppeteer from a low income background the opportunity to train with us.
- £2,500 pays for an Artist Bursary giving an aspiring puppetry company time and space to develop innovative new work.

Schools

Through our School Partnership Programme. we work closely with eight local primary schools, where pupils have a higher than average level of need. The value of puppetry as a cross-curriculum teaching tool, to raise literacy levels, confidence and communication skills, is well recognised. Our partnerships allow over 3,000 primary aged children to engage with LAT, who wouldn't normally have the opportunity to visit a theatre or take part in supplementary creative activities. The schools also have access to resources to support teachers in enlivening and enhancing the curriculum. These opportunities are vital at a time when arts provision is becoming more difficult and unaffordable. Little Angel Theatre works hard to allow children in our local area to feel connected to a creative community.

In the 24/25 academic year, we aim to roll our School Partnership Programme out across the country to enable us to give hundreds more children in targeted areas of low engagement, access to our shows and curriculum enhancing activities both live and digitally.

LAT at your School

In addition to our subsidised, targeted School Partnership Programme, we offer workshops to all other schools. **Indeed, LAT could bring the magic of puppetry to YOUR child's school.** Our school workshops are a fun and creative way for students to explore the curriculum, and provide a high-quality creative learning experience. We have specialist workshops designed for students of all ages (from Early Years right up to Key Stage 3+), and take enquiries about bespoke workshops if you have particular ideas in mind. What do our Partner Teachers Say?

We're Winton Primary School and we're one of eight Little Angel Theatre Partner Schools. We're a 1-form entry, mixed community school based in Kings Cross, Islington. We are a school with 58% Free School Meals and 20% SEND pupils. We've been involved with the Little Angel Theatre for around 5 years through a variety of projects.

Winton Primary have a curriculum that values creativity and accessing a breadth of life experiences – and our link with Little Angel Theatre (LAT) forms a significant part of that offer.

Through the partner schools programmes, we run a Puppet Club, access workshops (for children and staff) and make regular visits to see puppet shows at LAT. We receive a significant amount of tickets from LAT, which are allocated to us through the 'Puppets for All' scheme. This allows us to send whole year-groups to see these curricular enhancing performances, which are inspiring, engaging and transformative for our pupils. This is particularly valuable to us and our community, because our children fall under the top 5% most disadvantaged pupils in the country, yet, through enriching opportunities and a high quality curriculum, regularly feature in the top 100 schools in the country for attainment. This is no small achievement, and is only possible through our work with high quality, professional organisations such as the Little Angel Theatre. Community

We are located in Islington, which has the fourth highest rate of child poverty in the country after housing costs, and Sebbon Street, where our studios sit, ranks in the top 20% most deprived areas in the UK (2019 indices of multiple deprivation). Our community programme is completely free for those getting involved and consists of a wide range of fun activities for residents of all ages and backgrounds. This year, we provided 3,500 opportunities for local residents to experience the arts without financial barriers, something that would otherwise be unavailable and is often their only chance to engage with the arts.

3,511 instances of engagement with our local community across 127 sessions 16 community partners (including 8 prisons)

Crafternoons, our longest-running project, has seen families get stuck into an exciting new craft project each week. Last term, the crafting theme was colour, chosen each week by our "Crafternoon Spinning Colour Wheel" giving Crafternoon participants a voice in the sessions. The after-school club is consistently oversubscribed, so we are looking to pilot an additional club to allow older Crafternooners to continue engaging in the sessions.

This year, we also ran 17 **Garden Club** sessions, where families have come together to help tend to the community garden at our studios, and 25 **Little Wings** after school drama club sessions for children in Islington. Our adult programme has gained in strength and numbers through 31 **Knit&Natter** sessions, which provide a welcoming space for residents to socialise with neighbours while working on their projects, and 13 evening **Arts and Chats** sessions, exploring a range of artistic practices. These sessions all play a vital role in the well-being of LAT's community.



The Women's Project

The Women's Project 'Making Me', run in partnership with local women's refuge The Nia Project, provides a safe space for women, who have been the victims of male violence, to explore their creative expression through shadow puppetry alongside others who share their experiences. The women created a performance inspired by their discussion, and presented this to a small, selected, invited audience at the end of the course. Looking to the future, we are considering the possibilities of a Suitcase Theatre project, which would create a show for and with women who have been victims of domestic abuse, building on the work of 'Making Me'. Suitcase Theatre

Suitcase Theatre is a central aspect of LAT's charitable efforts. These small-scale, co-created theatre shows are easily portable and specifically designed to reach audiences who struggle to visit a traditional theatre setting. The shows are developed collaboratively with participants and artists from the targeted audience to ensure that they are authentic and effectively meet their needs.

The Welcome Project

We created The Welcome Project in collaboration with Phosphorus Theatre Company with the aim of supporting children who have experience of migrant and refugee status in Islington and the UK. The thirty minute participatory performance follows a young wizard, Eli, as he gets ready for school, until a new friend Effy is found in his laundry basket. The piece was designed without any verbal language so that we could perform the show in any setting, to almost any group of children no matter their understanding of the English language. The show was developed with people with lived experience of having refugee status and then toured, with everything in a suitcase, to community centres and bridging hotels - bringing the show to those it was made to help. ► Watch the video

In May 2023, we performed our hospital Suitcase Theatre show 'If not here... where?' to children in long-term care in 7 hospitals. The piece aimed to combat feelings of loneliness, raise morale and create a moment of connection for these isolated children. You can read much more about this project in our 2022 report.



This year we also hosted creative workshops in schools, as part of **A New Direction's Primary In-Schools Touring Programme**, where we discussed ideas around how children can make refugees feel welcomed and safe in their school or local area through a butterfly puppet-make. A further **540 school children** participated in this branch of the project.

Prison Project

Our next Suitcase Show will be The Prison Project, which enables children and their incarcerated parent to share a memorable day together, watching a tailor-made puppet show and taking part in a bespoke craft workshop that engages them creatively and speaks of their distinct experiences. Our performance-workshop structure offers families an opportunity to both watch and make together, creating a space to express themselves and connect through the arts. Moments for connection are incredibly important for the wellbeing of both children and adults in these settings, who get so little time to spend together. In fact, in many cases these prisons are limited to only one family day per year, so we want to ensure that they count.

The first phase of this project involved taking an existing Birthday Party show into prisons to determine interest. Demand was high and the prisons really valued our engagement. We are now moving onto the next phase where we will visit eight prison family days with a bespoke workshop that encourages attendees to contribute their thoughts on characters, themes and stories for a new show. We will then tour this show, designed for children and their incarcerated parents, directly to them in prisons.

Heritage Craft: Marionette Making

Little Angel Theatre takes birthday magic beyond its stage with our three party options. Delivering a professional puppetry experience, crafted by the teams behind the theatre's acclaimed productions, this is more than a party – it's an extension of LAT's childcentred ethos, promoting play, creativity and inclusivity. This year, we developed birthday parties for our very youngest birthday children, as well as for the older 7-9 age bracket, so that more children could celebrate with their friends through puppetry.

This work not only makes a birthday a theatrical experience, but it underpins our charitable and community led work, alongside support from trusts and foundations. In fact, our very own Masterchef Mo, went into prison family days 12 times last year, connecting children with their incarcerated parent and encouraging creativity among the participants, as part of the development of our latest Suitcase Show.

Puppets in Peril For ages 7–9

Calling all brave and brilliant adventurers, the fate of Fire Isle rests in your hands! Join the Game Masters on an epic quest to save the fantastical Fire Isle from certain danger. This year, the skill of marionette making was added to the Heritage Crafts' Red List of Endangered Crafts for the first time ever. The artform has fallen out of fashion with theatre makers, and there are only a handful of practitioners left in the UK who hold the skills and knowledge necessary to keep this tradition alive (many are nearing or in retirement).

Associate Director, Oliver Hymans, has been working hard to ensure the future of marionette making. In the last year he has trained with some of the best remaining marionette practitioners in the UK, including John Roberts, Lyndie Wright and Stephen Mottram. Oliver was also nominated as finalist for Heritage Craft and Axminster Tools' Woodworker of the Year 2023. He is now working to provide the next generation of puppeteers with the skills necessary to incorporate this unique and endangered artform into their creative practice. This makes Little Angel Theatre the only place in London (and most of the UK) providing training to makers and keeping the heritage craft of marionette making alive.

"It would be such a shame if this tradition died out and members of the puppetry sector lost the skills needed to keep it going. Puppets for All

Our Puppets For All scheme enables us to offer tickets completely free of charge to those who might otherwise miss out. The theatre is situated in Islington, one of the most unequal boroughs in the country, where some of the wealthiest families live alongside the poorest families – 28% of children in our borough live in an income deprived household. We know that the cost of tickets just isn't feasible for everyone, so we work very hard to make sure that the magic and wonder of puppetry is accessible to all, regardless of financial constraints.

In the coming year, we aim to:

- Provide 1,000 free tickets to families on state benefits.
- Provide 3,840 free tickets to pupils of our 8 partner schools (a minimum of one performance for each class at every partner school).
- Provide 480 free tickets to school pupils in Islington through the 11by11 Islington council scheme
- Provide 30 bursary places for our holiday playcations for children and their families.
- Provide 6 bursary places for our baby classes (Angel's Little Explorers).

This year we gave out **5,413** tickets to our shows to families and school visitors through the scheme, with a value equating to over **£50,000**, plus additional tickets for workshop places.

HOW CAN YOU HELP?

- £55 pays for 5 bursary places to Angel's Little Explorers - our weekly playtime for our smallest theatre goers
- £240 pays for 5 children to take part in an all-day Puppet Playcation

Environmental Responsibility

Combatting the climate crisis and protecting a creative future requires sustained action from individuals, organisations, nations and collective international efforts. Here at LAT, we must not only do everything possible to reduce our environmental impact but also set a good example, inform and educate young people in their responsibility to the environment. We are excited about the recent release of the Theatre Green Book 2.0 (providing updated guidelines and benchmarks for sustainable theatre making) and will be working to these standards in the coming year.

Our aims

- **Reduce:** We are working to decrease our energy use, reduce the waste we send to landfill and decrease the carbon cost of our productions both in-house and on tour.
- Understand: We will collect data from our organisation to understand our environmental impact. We will create Carbon Literacy Training to share that knowledge with everyone we work with.
- Advocate: We will continue to programme work which educates children around the ongoing climate crisis, and use our position to encourage environmentally responsible behavior within our audiences.

From February 2023-2024, we were taking part in the Mayor's Business Climate Challenge with the goal of reducing our building's energy consumption by 10%. With small changes on-site, we are delighted that we have managed to do this, reducing our energy consumption by 10.7%.

SOLAR PANEL FUNDRAISING

As an organisation, we aim to reduce our carbon output by 30% each year through commitments to sustainable production, touring, workshops and building operations. However, we are in a position where we require capital investment to make further headway in reducing our carbon output. We are seeking funding to install a solar installation on the roof of both our buildings. This will allow us to harness the sun's energy to offset some of our costs. Including some retiling of the roof, we estimate that this will cost around £115,000.

HOW CAN YOU HELP?

We are fundraising to help cover the costs of this installation

- £4,000 pays for an electrician to work on the installation of solar panels on our theatre roof
- £8,000 covers the material cost of a solar power system on our theatre roof
- £15,000 pays for us to remove the Asbestos tiling from our theatre, which has to be the first step in the project

People

Four Day Week Trial

This year we have been trialing a four day working week across as much of our activity as possible. The trial came about in order to try and reduce our carbon footprint, by closing our buildings one day per week, and to improve staff wellbeing. 31% of our workforce have caring responsibilities outside of work, and 15% identify as disabled (with almost half of those people stating mental health as a condition impacting their work life), so LAT wanted to make steps to support their staff as much as possible.

After an overwhelmingly positive response, and the majority of staff being able to find efficient ways of working to bring their roles into the four day pattern, we extended the trial for a further 6 months in February. There were some teething problems, particularly in delivery focused roles, where we have had to make adjustments to the model in order to support staff in the change. But these plans are being implemented during the second phase, and we will be continuing the conversations with all who work for us about their experience through to the end of the trial in August.

Finances

It has been a fantastic year for LAT, celebrating awards and delivering a range of exciting projects. This would not be possible without support from our generous funders, partnerships with co-producers and local organisations, and our ambitious, yet agile, financial management. Looking forward to the 2024/25 financial year, we will still rely on income from philanthropic sources, in particular for our community and outreach work, and the landscape continues to present challenges, with rising costs and inflationary pressures. We are opening the year having secured over 50% of our fundraising target, and continue to diversify and grow our earnt income (box office, touring, enterprise etc.)

We continue to adapt our model in response to the ever changing economic environment by:

- diversifying our fundraised and enterprise income streams to subsidise our schools and community engagement programme, as well as our digital output;
- keeping our admissions prices accessible, offering discounted and free tickets to those who would not otherwise be able to afford it;
- expanding the scope of our touring programme – working with 3rd party producers and broadening our own operation;
- honoring at least living wage salaries throughout our staff and creative teams, to go some way to tackle cost of living challenges
- reducing our environmental impact, whilst protecting and maintaining our cherished buildings;
- committing to allocate budget to activity that adds ethnic and/ or disability diversity to our work and operations.


